MAJORITY OF DRIVERS FACE CHARGE OF SPEEDING.

KINNEY SOUNDS WARNING

Spurred to greater activity by some cent remarks by Jerry Kinney, recent remarks by Jerry Kinney, chief of police, and Claude Johnson, lieutenant in charge of traffic. police motorcycle squad rounded up forty-one automobile drivers during the week-end for alleged violations of the motor vehicle laws.
