

TWO SUCCESSIVE VICTORIES



LOUIS CHEVROLET.

Many years of plans, struggles and work have been topped off with unusual success by Louis Chevrolet, designer and builder of the Frontenac straight eight racing car that Tommy Milton drove into victory at the 500-mile speedway race Monday. Up until last year Chevrolet had built many racing cars for the Indianapolis event and had never won, but in 1920 his youngster brother Gaston won with a Chevrolet built Monroe and this year Milton won with a new purple eight-in-a-row motor. Two victories here in successive races is something which has never been gained by any other engineer except Henri, the designer of the Peugeots which won in 1916, the last race before the war and in 1919, the first race after the war. Chevrolet has his machine shop at 621 Fulton street and there plans and builds his racing cars which have been so successful for the last two years.
