Raced Last Year in Texas: Youngsters Cop Big Money in Classic.

All unsespecting, San Antonio recing followers saw the winner of the 500-mile Indianapolis speedway classic, biggest and richest of motor tests, getting ready for his big effort on, the local two-mile speedway in 1925 and 1926.

He raced for a Houston car owner while here, and he did extremely well with his Fronty Ford mounts. Local drivers rated him as one of the best pilots in the San Antonio meets.

Bred Harder of Detroit, who won the 153-nile race Tuesday to open Detroit's half-mile board speedway, is another product of Texas tracks. He made his headquarters here for several years.
