## ORDER FROM HUGE FIRM

Greatly improved business in the last month has been announced by Arthur Chevrolet, president of the Chevrolair Motors, Inc., 410 West Tenth street, with every indication of improved orders in the near future for Chevrolair super-safety airplane motors.

Indicative of the improved business is a trial order received by Chevrolair Motors, Inc., from one of the largest airplane manufacturers of the United States, according to Chevrolet. With the satisfactory performance of these motors, attaches of the company point out, it is entirely logical that larger orders for motors will follow.

The Chevrolair motors—four cylinder and six cylinder—will be represented in the airplane races at Chicago, August 22 to September 1. The designers of one of the fastest airplanes in the United States has asked Chevrolet to provide motors for craft which he expects to enter in the races. The past performance of the Chevrolair motors in air races has been gratifying, according to Chevrolet.

Ships of the recently announced Detroit-to-Miami air line, built after the Heise design, will be equipped with the Chevrolet motors, according to announcement of the Great Lakes Southern Airlines, a Michigan corporation. The Detroit-Miami service is expected to open January 1, 1931, with stops at Louisville, Nashville, Atlanta and Jacksonville.

"While we are only interested in providing motors for the ships of this line," said Chevrolet, "it seems logical that Indianapolis should be one of the stops on this line, especially with the great number of Indiana people that go every winter to Miami and other Florida cities."
