

# JACOBY SEEMS TO BE WRONG MAN

Arrested in Connection with an  
Accident Near This City on  
Fourth of July.

WAS IN CUBA AT THAT TIME

Opinion Is the Greenfield Man  
Read the License Plate on  
Automobile Wrong.

While riding in an automobile on the road running south from this city July 4th, Arthur Frazier and family were thrown from their car and some of them injured when a large automobile driven by a smooth-faced man about 40 years old crowded them off the road and as he thundered by belled with an oath, "Get out of the road or I'll knock you out."

Mr. Frazier took the number of the license, and reported the affair to the prosecuting attorney, Waldo C. Ging, and at the office of the secretary of State it was found that the license on the car was issued to Ernest L. Jacoby, of Indianapolis.

However, when Mr. Jacoby was arrested on the charge it was seen that he was not the man who was driving the car, as he wears a full beard and is perhaps twenty years the senior of the speed fiend. The following is from The Indianapolis News:

"When Ernest L. Jacoby, 3637 Kenwood avenue, president of the Frontenac Motors Corporation, appeared in the city court Tuesday afternoon to face charges filed against him as the driver of an automobile which figured in an accident at Greenfield some time ago, he was at a loss, he asserted to understand how he could be involved in the affair, because, he said, he had just returned from Cuba and had not driven through Greenfield in the last year.

"The affidavits against Jacoby, which charged him with being a fugitive from justice, failing to stop after an accident, assault and battery, speeding and malicious trespass, were based, it was learned, on the license number given a Greenfield deputy

sheriff by witnesses of the accident, obtained was the same as that issued The license number that the deputy to Jacoby. It is the belief of Louis Chevrolet, who appeared in court with the defendant, that the number had been misread.

"Jacoby said Vint Cook, the deputy sheriff, would not tell him the date of the accident. The deputy failed to identify Jacoby as the driver of the car, and the case was continued until new witnesses can be brought from Greenfield."
